Course Content

This course on Educating for the 21st Century is a two-week course consisting of 40 contact hours plus an extensive cultural programme. Advice is provided on opportunities for extended Informal Learning and Personal Research related to their course on Saturday and Sunday

Format

A **2-week course** consisting of **40 classroom contact hours** which are complemented and reinforced by a series of afternoon activities where the participants are encouraged to enhance their knowledge of Ireland in a more informal environment outside of the classroom, with a focus on exploiting school trips in their own teaching environments to develop 21st century skills, as well as films on the subjects covered
