**Objectives**

This course is designed to develop and improve Italian language teaching skills, through various techniques and communicative methodological approaches of teaching Italian as a Foreign Language. Grammar, phonology, lexis and all other features of actual language use in everyday situations are analysed. A wide variety of up-to-date authentic material is used in class, thus giving the participants valuable information about modern-day Italian culture and society at the same time as developing their authentic linguistic and communicative skills. Amongst the principal techniques and procedures employed in class are communicative tasks, group work, and dramatization. The accent is on activity rather than on passive receptivity.

**Course Content and Strategies**

The 60 hours program provides two parts:

A) The part dedicated to teaching aims to enrich the teaching and methodological knowledge for teaching Italian to non-native speakers. Two weeks of:

## Topics

### Grammar: centrality of the student in action

"How do I do grammar in a non-boring way?" We believe that studying grammar can be fun. Learning is facilitated in a context characterized by serenity and in a relaxed atmosphere in which students will better understand grammar:

1. Students are active in competing within their group & against the opposing group.
2. The students' cognitive resources are naturally deployed

### Other related topics and activities:

- The student as a researcher
- Analytical reading; methods and purposes
- Recreational activities: the analytical relay; the word exchanged; cloze in movements

### Talking and writing: two goals between failures and successes

"My student doesn't speak";  
"I would like to do more written productions but I always I give up"

How many times do we discuss this with our colleagues?. Being able to communicate in the language you are studying is one of those gratifications that more than any other fortifies in the student the conviction of having made a good choice. Non-guided written and oral production are the activities bring this reward.

### Culture...

Our authentic material draws on aspects of Italian life and culture. The authentic material is the object of the student's analysis. Practice and discussion are always focused on the real language.

- analysis of the main glottodidactic theories applied in practice
- didactic activities: new didactic activities will be examined to increase the choice for the teacher;
- laboratories and microteaching.
- class observations: there will be sessions of guided observations in class, during which the participants will be called to perform tasks.
- sessions for the preparation and testing of teaching materials or meetings with Publishing Houses.

B) The part dedicated to culture will have a twofold objective:

1. how to introduce elements of culture into the lessons. Educational activities will aimed at: cinema, literature, music, art.
2. being introduced in the history and art of a unique city. Tours in Rome and outside Rome will be conducted by specialized guides. The strategies used in class aims to make students independent in the learning process: they use their interlanguage from day one in a relaxed and friendly atmosphere.
